- #9 BAGS to collect waste

- #11 VET'S CONTACT INFORMATION
- #12 GROOMING ITEMS
- #13 PAPER TOWELS & DISINFECTANT
- #14 BLANKETS OR TOWELS
- #15 PILLOW CASE to trap snakes
